
Closer to Home


Traffic Deaths in South Carolina

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

Shot Pouch Greenway

- The greenway provides a safe and efficient route for cyclists and pedestrians and improved connections to neighborhoods, parks, goods, and services.
- The Shot Pouch Greenway is an entirely paved trail that provides accessible outdoor recreation opportunities to people of all ages.
- The greenway also provides protected greenspace in the heart of the city and a natural buffer of land along the Shot Pouch Branch helping protect the quality of water and the abundant wildlife that lives in the area.






Shot Pouch Greenway

- Vision dates back to 2000, Mayor Joe McElveen.
- Added to MPO Long Range Transportation Plan and first segment established in 2007.
- Funds awarded for remaining portion 15 years later, via Penny Sales Tax.
- Intended termini were Dillon Park at North, and Swan Lake at South, intersecting downtown Sumter.
- Hope to establish a "Grand Loop", as identified in their Long Range Transportation Plan.

Lessons Learned from Shot Pouch Greenway

- Establish "logical termini". Establish segments where you can, even if they seem isolated.
- Work to close gaps in the network.
- Document your ideas and incorporate into a comprehensive plan and your Long Range Transportation Plan.
- Invite community input early-on, and track public input and interest in the planning process.
 - Identify creative funding sources for future project implementation.

Recreational Trails Program



RTP is a federally-funded grant program of the U.S. Dept. of Transportation's Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) that offers financial support to states for the development and upkeep of recreational trails and trail-related facilities.

Rethink Folly Road

- Corridor having parcels in City of Charleston, Town of James Island, and Charleston County
- Master plan adopted 2016
- Zoning overlays for adopted ~2017



Recreational Trails Program

- Local, State, and Federal agencies, as well as established 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations can apply
- The RTP project agreement period is 18 months
- 25-year project compliance term
- Project sponsors must follow the state procurement code and regulations
- RTP is a reimbursement grant that requires at least a 20% match project sponsor pays 100% upfront RTP reimburses up to 80% of total project cost
